Now no teacher ever guesses, that Robin will be one of the most favorite grammar school teachers, and Julie will be a very popular pediatrician one day.


The bell rings. School has just finished. Vacations are starting now. Quickly all the pupils get their school bags ready, say good-bye to their teachers and run home.

Day 17


This is a very nice day. The Starbacks have taken a place on the beach again to enjoy the sea.

Today the sea isn't smooth. There are waves rushing to the shoreline, and the kids have a lot of fun playing in these waves. They know that they have to watch the sea continuously in order to react in the right way.

They enjoy jumping up, when a wave surges up to a wall of water of about one and a half meters high. They dive under, when a big wave comes rolling to the shore. In this way they let such a wave roll over them.

But they have much more fun, when a big wave already has surged up to a wall coming closer and closer and bends towards over the swimmers. Then all the swimmers start crawling in front of such a wave and let this wave catch them. In this way the swimmers always get a very high speed at crawling to the shores.²

² <u>Caution:</u> Never go into the sea, when the waves are higher than max 6 feet and/or red flags are set up on a beach! Red flags forbid swimming in the sea because of life danger! Even if the sea is seemingly smooth, a red flag can forbid swimming because of *Rip-Currents* or sharks. Those treacherous dangers are not visible for tourists, who don't know the place. Only green flags allow swimming in the sea. However, even then there's no 100% guarantee of safety. Natural waters are too incalculable. Suddenly two smaller Roma boys drift around on the beach and seemingly beg for money. As the Starbacks have already had their experiences with one Roma man³, they hide all their beach bags at once. They have learnt by conversations with other

³ Romas are a small group of people, which are spread all over the world. Most of them lead a nomadic life. Only some very few ones have settled down somewhere. They always have to fight against the common and general suspicion of stealing intentions again and again. It's a fact that there isn't known a lot about those people in general public knowledge. Sadly only the bad experiences a lot of tourists make with some few confidence tricksters of the Roma are known. This always gives oxygen to general prejudices, which try to justify hard discrimination. However, one does not need to be a Roma to be a confidence trickster. One can also be such one as a tourist or a citizen of a country. Generally the Roma are a very proud community. They quiet rightly fight against been called gypsies pejoratively. They have always been Roma and they insist on their right to be accepted and respected as an equal community. In history this group of people have suffered as much misery as the Native Americans. tourists, that they are not the only ones. So they watch those two boys very carefully now. Even the kids come out of the water now and watch out for those Roma boys.

As soon as the boys go there, everybody seems to be sure that, they really want to steal something. At once the group of kids rush to them and seemingly invite them to play. They do it in such a friendly way, that these two Roma boys join this group after a short hesitation. But the two boys continue keeping an eye on that unsupervised place. So it isn't very easy for the tourist children, to get their full attention at playing. [...]

Appendix

I. Rip Currents

Rip currents are one of the most treacherous dangers in the sea. They occur when waves rush to the shoreline and the water flows back out to sea through darker and deeper channels. There are different types of rips, such as Fixed Rips, Flash Rips, Topographic Rips and Mega Rips.

The speed of the rip currents depends on the height of the waves rushing to the shore. So if the waves are higher, the rip currents flow faster. If the waves are lower, the rip

currents flow slower. But even slower rips of about 0,5 to 1 meter per second make it almost impossible to stand or to stay in one place. Flash rips and Mega rips even reach a speed of about 2 – 3 meters per second and stronger. This is more than an Olympic swimmer is able to make.

Not only every beach can be effected by rip currents every time, but also inland lakes!

Rip currents are not an undertow. They do not pull you under water. They only pull you out to sea for about 100 meters, take you away from the beach.

You can spot a rip current at the following signs:

- deeper darker water
- fewer breaking waves
- sometimes sandy colored water extending beyond the surf zone
- debris or seaweed
- sometimes it's easier to look for where the waves are breaking consistently, and then look to each side where they don't break consistently. That's the rip current!

II. Gypsies, Roma,Travellers: AnAnimated History

Editor's note: The terms Gypsies, Roma, and Travellers are broad titles which describe diverse and different communities and are used in this article and film as general descriptors for the purpose of clarity. For a fuller discussion of these terms see the comments section below and Roma explainer at right.

The Roma are a people like any other, dispersed across many lands and territories over time and circumstance.

Europe is home to 10–12 million Roma and Travellers, yet many Europeans are unable to answer the basic question, "Who are the Roma?" Even fewer can answer questions about their history.

It is a complex and highly contested narrative, partly because the "Roma" are not a single, homogeneous group of people. They can include Romanichals in England; Kalé in Wales and Finland; Travellers in Ireland (who are not Roma), Scotland, Sweden, and Norway; Manouche from France; Gitano from Spain; Sinti from Germany,

Poland, Austria, and Italy; Ashakli from Kosovo; Egyptians from Albania; Beyash from Croatia; Romanlar from Turkey; Domari from Palestine and Egypt; Lom from Armenia, and many others. It is also partly because many of these groups have differing narratives of their history and *ethnogenesis*(their origins as an ethnic group). The Roma do not follow a single faith, but are Catholic Manouche, Mercheros, and Sinti; Muslim Ashkali and Romanlar; Pentecostal Kalderash and Lovari; Protestant Travellers; Anglican Gypsies; and Baptist Roma. There are variations in practises associated with birth, marriages and death, yet also linked cultures that display subtle but distinctive patterns or, as a Roma preacher once described it, "many stars scattered in the sight of God."

Yet there *is* much that is shared between different groups of Roma. Roma have a common lexicon in differing dialects of *Rromanës*, the Romani language. There are common notions around cleanliness codes and behaviors regarding what is *Rromano* (to behave with dignity and respect as a Roma person) and what can be seen as part of *Rromanipé* or the "Romani world view."
